




# **Lottery Results at a Glance**

In the 2025-26 lottery a total of

22,443

students submitted one or more applications.



Of the 16,828 applicants who were matched to a school,


63%

matched to their #1 choice school.



<sup>\*</sup>The match rate is the percentage of all applicants who applied and received a match.


## **Total Number of Matches – Year to Year**






## Distribution of Matches by Ranked Preference

A record number of applicants matched to their #1 school choice, beating 2023's last record by 36 matches.




## Number of Applications vs. Lottery Seats

In SY25-26, LEAs offered a total of 35,071 seats. There were more lottery seats than applications submitted in every grade, but PK3 saw the greatest differential with 7,000 seats offered for 4,800 applicants.




# **Applications vs. Lottery Seats Offered**

More seats were offered than applicants across all entry grades, with the greatest increase seen at in 9<sup>th</sup> grade.



At PK3, D.C. offered over 7,000 seats for 4,800 three-year-olds. This increase is entirely from existing LEA's offering additional seats in the lottery.






In 9<sup>th</sup> grade, the number of applicants has remained quite steady, but the number of seats offered has increased most years.



## **Percent Matching 100% of Their Lottery Seats**


With a third straight year of additional seats offered in the lottery, less than 1 in 5 schools matched 100% of their seats in SY25-26.






### **Majority of Schools Match Less Than 75% of Seats**

236\* schools offered 35,071 seats in the lottery (+4,613, 15%).






# **Equitable Access at a Glance**

In the 2025-26 lottery a total of

3,580

students were found eligible and applied to one or more schools participating in Equitable Access (EA).



Of the 3,580 EA eligible applicants

685


matched via an Equitable Access preference or designated seat.





## How did Equitable Access Influence Matches?


We ran the lottery without the Equitable Access preference, and found that the preference added:




Put another way, 135 (4%) of the 3,580 qualifying equitable access students received either an initial match, or more preferred match, than they would have received without the preference.




## How did Equitable Access Influence Matches?





Like the past two lottery cycles, Early Childhood continues to see the largest increase in match's due to additional Equitable Access seats being available.





### I Dream PCS - School Closure

#### **Background:**

- ❖ I Dream PCS was up for its 5-year charter review by PCSB this year.
- ❖ In March, PCSB completed its review and issued a recommendation that I Dream PCS's charter be renewed with conditions.
- On March 20, I Dream PCS's Executive Director contacted MSDC to request that its seats be removed from the SY25-26 lottery, which MSDC honored before it ran the lottery.
  - This put all applicants to I Dream PCS not matched to other schools on their waitlist.
- On March 26, I Dream PCS notified PCSB it was voluntarily relinquishing its charter, effective June 18, 2025.
- On April 7, I Dream PCS's charter relinquishment was made public and read into the record at PCSB's Board Meeting.

#### **Current status and MSDC response:**

- ❖ MSDC sent an email to all families on I Dream PCS's waitlist to notify them that the school is closing.
- ❖ PCSB has assigned specialists to work with I Dream PCS families on identifying alternative SY25-26 school choices for its currently enrolled 94 students as a part of its closure plan.
- ❖ PCSB is holding an enrollment fair for I Dream PCS families on April 25 from 3-5pm. MSDC staff will be present to advise families on their school options and assist them in applying to new schools. ◀

## **Hope Community PCS**

#### **Background:**

- ❖ This year, Hope Community PCS ("Hope") was up for its 20-year charter review by PCSB.
- ❖ In March, PCSB issued its report and recommended Hope's charter be renewed with conditions.
- ❖ On March 17, PCSB reviewed Hope's charter review recommendations in a Public Meeting.
- ❖ On March 26, Hope Community PCS's Board Chair emailed MSDC to notify us that it would be scheduling a vote to close the school at the end of SY24-25.
- On March 27, MSDC removed Hope's seats from the lottery based on its uncertain operating status in SY25-26 (per MSDC policy) and re-ran the lottery.
  - Placed all Hope Community PCS applicants not matched to other schools on their waitlist.
- ❖ On April 4, Hope Community PCS' Board met and decided to table its vote on the school's closure.

#### **Current status:**

- Hope Community PCS is still planning to be open for SY25-26 and will maintain its charter so long as it meets the conditions outlined in its charter review agreement.
- \* Hope Community PCS can still enroll new students by making offers off its waitlist.



# Policy Consideration: Re-enrollment of Former Students



#### **Presenting Issue/Background:**

- Several USAID families living abroad, learned they may be returning to DC after the lottery deadline passed this year.
- Contacted MSDC and various LEAs seeking to re-enroll their children in their prior schools for educational continuity and to ease their re-entry.
- Learned some LEAs have return to school/leave of absence policies that permit these families to re-enroll without entering the lottery and others do not.
  - Some LEAs called MSDC to confirm they were authorized by MSDC to implement their policies.
- Discovered these LEA policies are not explicitly authorized nor prohibited via our current MSDC policies.

# **Current Policy: Re-enrollment of Returning Students**

- Only gives LEAs discretion to determine re-enrollment policies for <u>current</u> students, not <u>former</u> students.
  - The deadlines and processes for re-enrollment are managed solely by LEAs. Schools may have different timelines and processes for <u>current</u> students to reenroll.
- Current MSDC policy does not allow LEAs to give preference to former students in the lottery, yet existing LEA policies give those students preference by allowing them to re-enroll without entering the lottery, if they meet certain conditions.
  - No LEA may implement or indicate the existence of a preference for former students. These students will go on the school's waitlist if forced to re-apply and could be at the bottom.

# Policy Consideration: Re-enrollment of Former Students

#### **Questions for Board Consideration/Discussion:**

- 1) Should the Board address this issue in our MSDC Policy Guide section on Reenrollment or is that unnecessary and outside of our purview?
- 2) If so, should we add language to codify current practice which states that LEAs have the discretion to determine re-enrollment policies of former students and can permit them to re-enroll without entering the lottery?







- Identify participating schools that enrolled students outside of the My School DC process
- Analyze requested lottery grades and enrolled lottery grades of applicants
- Analyze enrollment error trends in the SY24-25 lottery and the Centralized Waitlist Management System ("CWMS") usage




## **Key SY24-25 Findings**

- 14% decrease (32 in SY24-25 versus 37 in SY23-24) in errors that could have caused displacement; 27% decrease in errors causing a likely displacement; 16% decrease in total errors.
- 15% decrease in grade level discrepancies compared to SY23-24.
- 85% of lottery applicants received a match or waitlist offer by October 2024.

## **Enrollment Errors Over Time**




16% decrease in citywide errors from SY23-24



## **Student Displacement Due to Enrollment Errors**



Fewer students were likely displaced in SY24-25 than we've seen since the start of our auditing process.
